Mark 8:35 (NLT)

³⁵ If you try to hang on to your life, you will lose it. But if you give up your life for my sake and for the sake of the Good News, you will save it.



Keys to Ecclesiastes—

Key Word: Vanity

Looked at "under the sun" (8:17), Life's pursuits lead only to frustration....The key word is *vanity*, the futile emptiness of trying to make sense out of life apart from God.

The perspective of the natural man who only sees life "under the sun," the conclusion is, "all *is* vanity." **Life's every activity**, even though pleasant for the moment, **becomes purposeless and futile when viewed as an end in itself**.

Key Chapter (12)—At the end of the Book ... Chapter 12 resolves the book's extensive inquiry into the meaning of life with the single conclusion, "Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man" (12:13).¹

Only when....views his life from God's perspective "above the sun" does it take on meaning as a precious gift "from the hand of God" (2:24).

Key Verses (2:24; 12:13-14)—

- "There is nothing better for a man than that he should eat and drink, and that his soul should enjoy good in his labor. This also, I saw, was from the hand of God" (2:24).
- Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: "Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man. For **God** will bring every work into **judgment**, including every secret thing, whether it is good or whether it is evil" (12:13–14).
