Scripture: Mark 14:32-42

- The Bible contains some famous garden scenes. How many can your group name?
- Which two are the most famous?
- What distinguishes them? (Hint: Romans 5:11-21)

Luke 21 tells us that Jesus often spent the night in this area.

Luke 21:37-38 (ESV)

<sup>37</sup> And every day he was teaching in the temple, but at night he went out and lodged on the mount called Olivet. <sup>38</sup> And early in the morning, all the people came to him in the temple to hear him.

John 18:2 (ESV) tells us that Judas knew the area well.

<sup>2</sup> Now Judas, who betrayed him, also knew the place, for Jesus often met there with his disciples.

Knowing that Judas went out to betray him, Jesus went to the most obvious place.

So what does that tell you about Jesus?<sup>i</sup>









- What "weapon" does Jesus recommend to overcome temptation?
  (Mark 14:38)
- What weapon does Peter think he needs?
- Who was right?
- What are you relying upon to either deliver or distract you from trouble?
- Is it the right weapon?

Mark 14:36 (ESV)

36 And he said.

- all things are possible for you.

How does Jesus' prayer in Mark 14:36 connect conceptually to the prayer He taught us to pray in Matthew 6:19?

Matthew 6:9–15 (ESV)

<sup>9</sup> Pray then like this: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. <sup>10</sup> Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. <sup>11</sup> Give us this day our daily bread, <sup>12</sup> and forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. <sup>13</sup> And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

- Where do you see those significant issues in Mark 14:36?
- What is God's will? (Matt 6:33)
- What is your will?
- What do you sense the Lord calling you to set your face firmly to do?
